General Power Tool Safety Warnings

AWARNING

Read all safety warnings, instructions, illustrations and specifications provided with this power tool. Failure to follow all instructions listed below may result in electric shock, fire and/or serious injury.

Save all warnings and instructions for future reference.

The term "power tool" in the warnings refers to your mains-operated (corded) power tool or battery-operated (cordless) power tool.

- 1. Work area safety
 - a. Keep work area clean and well lit.

 Cluttered or dark areas invite accidents.
 - b. Do not operate power tools in explosive atmospheres, such as in the presence of flammable liquids, gases or dust. Power tools create sparks which may ignite the dust or fumes.
- c. Keep children and bystanders away while operating a power tool. Distractions can cause you to lose control.
- 2. Electrical safety
 - a. Power tool plugs must match the outlet.

 Never modify the plug in any way. Do not use any adapter plugs with earthed (grounded) power tools. Unmodified plugs and matching outlets will reduce risk of electric shock.

- b. Avoid body contact with earthed or grounded surfaces, such as pipes, radiators, ranges and refrigerators.

 There is an increased risk of electric shock if your body is earthed or grounded.
- c. Do not expose power tools to rain or wet conditions. Water entering a power tool will increase the risk of electric shock.
- d. Do not abuse the cord. Never use the cord for carrying, pulling or unplugging the power tool. Keep cord away from heat, oil, sharp edges or moving parts. Damaged or entangled cords increase the risk of electric shock.
- e. When operating a power tool outdoors, use an extension cord suitable for outdoor use. Use of a cord suitable for outdoor use reduces the risk of electric shock.
- f. If operating a power tool in a damp location is unavoidable, use a ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI) protected supply. Use of a GFCI reduces the risk of electric shock.

3. Personal safety

- a. Stay alert, watch what you are doing and use common sense when operating a power tool. Do not use a power tool while you are tired or under the influence of drugs, alcohol or medication. A moment of inattention while operating power tools may result in serious personal injury.
- b. Use personal protective equipment. Always wear eye protection. Protective equipment such as dust mask, non-skid safety shoes, hard hat, or hearing protection used for appropriate conditions will reduce personal injuries.

4. Power tool use and care

- a. Do not force the power tool. Use the correct power tool for your application. The correct power tool will do the job better and safer at the rate for which it was designed.
- b. Do not use the power tool if the switch does not turn it on and off. Any power tool that cannot be controlled with the switch is dangerous and must be repaired.

- c. Disconnect the plug from the power source and/or remove the battery pack, if detachable, from the power tool before making any adjustments, changing accessories, or storing power tools.

 Such preventive safety measures reduce the risk of starting the power tool accidentally.
- d. Store idle power tools out of the reach of children and do not allow persons unfamiliar with the power tool or these instructions to operate the power tool. Power tools are dangerous in the hands of untrained users.
- e. Maintain power tools and accessories.
 Check for misalignment or binding of moving parts, breakage of parts and any other condition that may affect the power tool's operation. If damaged, have the power tool repaired before use. Many accidents are caused by poorly maintained power tools.
- f. **Keep cutting tools sharp and clean.** Properly maintained cutting tools with sharp cutting edges are less likely to bind and are easier to control.
- g. Use the power tool, accessories and tool bits etc. in accordance with these instructions, taking into account the working conditions and the work to be performed. Use of the power tool for operations different from those intended could result in a hazardous situation.
- h. Keep handles and grasping surfaces dry, clean and free from oil and grease. Slippery handles and grasping surfaces do not allow for safe handling and control of the tool in unexpected situations.

5. Service

- a. Have your power tool serviced by a qualified repair person using only identical replacement parts. This will ensure that the safety of the power tool is maintained.
- Maintain labels and nameplates on the tool.
 These carry important safety information.
 If unreadable or missing, contact
 Harbor Freight Tools for a replacement.

6. Safety instructions for routers

- a. Hold the power tool by insulated gripping surfaces only, because the cutter may contact its own cord. Cutting a "live" wire may make exposed metal parts of the power tool "live" and could give the operator an electric shock.
- b. Use clamps or another practical way to secure and support the workpiece to a stable platform. Holding the work by your hand or against the body leaves it unstable and may lead to loss of control.
- c. Let bit cool before touching, changing or adjusting it. Bits heat up dramatically while in use, and can burn you.

7. Vibration Safety

This tool vibrates during use. Repeated or long-term exposure to vibration may cause temporary or permanent physical injury, particularly to the hands, arms and shoulders. To reduce the risk of vibration-related injury:

- a. Anyone using vibrating tools regularly or for an extended period should first be examined by a doctor and then have regular medical check-ups to ensure medical problems are not being caused or worsened from use. Pregnant women or people who have impaired blood circulation to the hand, past hand injuries, nervous system disorders, diabetes, or Raynaud's Disease should not use this tool. If you feel any symptoms related to vibration (such as tingling, numbness, and white or blue fingers), seek medical advice as soon as possible.
- b. Do not smoke during use. Nicotine reduces the blood supply to the hands and fingers, increasing the risk of vibration-related injury.
- c. Wear suitable gloves to reduce the vibration effects on the user.
- d. Use tools with the lowest vibration when there is a choice.
- e. Include vibration-free periods each day of work.
- f. Grip tool as lightly as possible (while still keeping safe control of it). Let the tool do the work.
- g. To reduce vibration, maintain the tool as explained in this manual. If any abnormal vibration occurs, stop use immediately.


Grounding

AWARNING

TO PREVENT ELECTRIC SHOCK AND DEATH FROM INCORRECT GROUNDING WIRE CONNECTION:

Check with a qualified electrician if you are in doubt as to whether the outlet is properly grounded. Do not modify the power cord plug provided with the tool. Never remove the grounding prong from the plug. Do not use the tool if the power cord or plug is damaged. If damaged, have it repaired by a service facility before use. If the plug will not fit the outlet, have a proper outlet installed by a qualified electrician.


Grounded Tools: Tools with Three Prong Plugs




3-Prong Plug and Outlet

- Tools marked with "Grounding Required" have a three wire cord and three prong grounding plug. The plug must be connected to a properly grounded outlet. If the tool should electrically malfunction or break down, grounding provides a low resistance path to carry electricity away from the user, reducing the risk of electric shock. (See 3-Prong Plug and Outlet.)
- 2. The grounding prong in the plug is connected through the green wire inside the cord to the grounding system in the tool. The green wire in the cord must be the only wire connected to the tool's grounding system and must never be attached to an electrically "live" terminal. (See 3-Prong Plug and Outlet.)
- The tool must be plugged into an appropriate outlet, properly installed and grounded in accordance with all codes and ordinances. The plug and outlet should look like those in the preceding illustration. (See 3-Prong Plug and Outlet.)

Double Insulated Tools: Tools with Two Prong Plugs





Outlets for 2-Prong Plug

- Tools marked "Double Insulated" do not require grounding. They have a special double insulation system which satisfies OSHA requirements and complies with the applicable standards of Underwriters Laboratories, Inc., the Canadian Standard Association, and the National Electrical Code.
- Double insulated tools may be used in either of the 120 volt outlets shown in the preceding illustration. (See Outlets for 2-Prong Plug.)

Extension Cords

- Grounded tools require a three wire extension cord.
 Double Insulated tools can use either a two or three wire extension cord.
- 2. As the distance from the supply outlet increases, you must use a heavier gauge extension cord. Using extension cords with inadequately sized wire causes a serious drop in voltage, resulting in loss of power and possible tool damage. (See Table A.)
- 3. The smaller the gauge number of the wire, the greater the capacity of the cord. For example, a 14 gauge cord can carry a higher current than a 16 gauge cord. (See Table A.)
- When using more than one extension cord to make up the total length, make sure each cord contains at least the minimum wire size required. (See Table A.)

- If you are using one extension cord for more than one tool, add the nameplate amperes and use the sum to determine the required minimum cord size. (See Table A.)
- 6. If you are using an extension cord outdoors, make sure it is marked with the suffix "W-A" ("W" in Canada) to indicate it is acceptable for outdoor use.
- 7. Make sure the extension cord is properly wired and in good electrical condition. Always replace a damaged extension cord or have it repaired by a qualified electrician before using it.
- 3. Protect the extension cords from sharp objects, excessive heat, and damp or wet areas.

Tool Setup

Bit Installation

WARNING! TO PREVENT SERIOUS INJURY:

Use only rotary cutting bits of the correct shank diameter for the collet mounted. Use only rotary cutting bits suitable for the speed of the tool.

WARNING! TO PREVENT SERIOUS INJURY:

Carefully inspect router bits for cracks, chips, or other damage before installing. Do not use bits that have been dropped, cracked, or damaged. The bit may shatter causing serious injury.


 Use only bits (sold separately) with 1/4" shank size, that are marked as suitable for the type of material being cut, and are marked with a speed equal or higher than the maximum speed marked on the tool. Do not use a bit with a cutting diameter larger than the opening in the base. 2. Unlock the Lock Lever.




3. Rotate Main Housing to raise or lower Spindle to access Spindle and Collet Nut with Wrenches.



 Turn Router upside down and hold Spindle in place with Spindle Wrench while turning Collet Nut counterclockwise with Collet Nut Wrench to loosen Collet Nut.



5. Remove or insert a Collet Chuck as needed to fit the bit size, then insert bit (sold separately) and tighten Collet Nut with Wrenches.




Edge Guide Installation

Use Edge Guide to make cuts parallel to the edge of a workpiece, or following a guide clamped onto workpiece.

- 1. Loosen Wing Nuts.
- Slide Guide Poles on Guide into slots on Base of Router with Guide facing workpiece.

<u>Note:</u> The Edge Guide can be inserted into either side of the tool to make cuts along the left or right side of the material.

- a. Adjust distance between router bit and Guide to desired setting.
- b. Tighten Wing Nuts.




 Place Router on a flat wood surface. Unlock the Lock Lever.



2. Rotate Main Housing until tip of bit touches the workpiece surface. Lock the Lock Lever.



3. Slide Scale Ring until the "0" aligns with index line (vertical mark) on Main Housing. Unlock the Lock Lever. Each line on scale raises or lowers bit by 1/64".



 While holding Base up from surface, rotate Main Housing to raise or lower bit until index line on housing aligns with desired depth on scale ring. Lock the Lock Lever.



Work Piece and Work Area Set Up

- Designate a work area that is clean and well-lit.
 The work area must not allow access by children or pets to prevent distraction and injury.
- Route the power cord along a safe route to reach the work area without creating a tripping hazard or exposing the power cord to possible damage. The power cord must reach the work area with enough extra length to allow free movement while working.
- 3. Secure loose work pieces using a vise or clamps (not included) to prevent movement while working.
- Make sure there are no metal objects in the wood which might make contact with the router bit.

- 5. Hold Router handles firmly with both hands.
- Keep hands away from rotating bit. Unplug the tool and wait until the bit stops rotating completely before making adjustments.
- 7. Do not touch the bit right after cutting. It becomes very hot.
- 8. Before cutting material, turn the Router on. Watch and feel for vibration which could indicate an improperly installed bit.
- 9. Turn the Router off when not actually cutting. Do not leave running.

General Operating Instructions


Note: Use two or more passes for deep cuts, especially in the case of hardwood. Do not attempt to cut deeper than 5/8" in a single pass. Turn Depth Stop Turret so that the first pass will be less than 5/8" deep, then rotate Turret one step for each progressive pass, until final depth is achieved.

<u>CAUTION!</u> When first turning on the Router, grip the Handles firmly as the tool may try to twist from the strong initial torque.


<u>Note:</u> The Router bit should always be fed into the stock from left to right so as to match the clockwise rotation of the router. When cutting outside edges, rotate the router counterclockwise. Rotate it clockwise when cutting inside edges.


Note: Make practice cuts at different speeds in scrap material until you are able to produce a smooth cut with no burnishing or burn marks. Burn marks are caused by moving too slowly through the wood. Feeding the Router too quickly, or trying to remove too much material in a single pass creates a rough cut and can overload the motor.

<u>WARNING!</u> TO PREVENT SERIOUS INJURY: Moving the router against the recommended direction can cause serious injury from kickback.

- 1. Hold Router handles firmly with both hands.
- Place Router directly above the point you plan to cut. Verify that there are no obstructions in cutting path.
- 3. Make sure Trigger is in off-position, then plug in tool.
- 4. Turn on Router.
- Before cutting material, watch and feel for vibration which could indicate an improperly installed bit. Turn off and re-install bit, if needed.
- Allow bit to come to full speed, slowly engage material. DO NOT force Router down into the material.



- 7. When finished, raise Router so bit is clear of material, then turn Power Switch off. Do not set Router down until bit has come to a complete stop.
- 8. Do not touch bit right after cutting. It becomes very hot. Allow to cool before changing bits.
- 9. Do not leave Router running when not actually cutting. Turn power off between cuts.
- To prevent accidents, disconnect power supply after use. Clean, then store tool indoors out of children's reach.

Maintenance and Servicing Instructions



Procedures not specifically explained in this manual must be performed only by a qualified technician.

Cleaning, Maintenance, and Lubrication


- BEFORE EACH USE, inspect the general condition of the tool. Check for loose hardware, misalignment or binding of moving parts, cracked or broken parts, damaged electrical wiring, and any other condition that may affect its safe operation.
- 2. **AFTER USE**, wipe external surfaces of the tool with clean cloth.

- Regularly clean all ventilation openings by periodically brushing with a soft brush and/ or blowing clear with compressed air.
- 4. AWARNING! TO PREVENT SERIOUS INJURY: If the supply cord of this power tool is damaged, it must be replaced only by a qualified service technician.

Replacing Carbon Brushes

Remove and check the Carbon Brushes regularly. Replace when they wear down to the limit mark on the carbon. Replace both brushes at the same time.

To replace: Remove the Brush Caps and old brushes, then insert the new brushes and secure the caps in place.
